

GENERAL GARDEN INFO

This is a small garden article this week and covers some general things in the garden.
Our swanplant has got an infestation of milkweed aphids, (probably Aphis nerii). Unlike the black aphids in the last Planet, these are a nice orange. Still not a nice pest to have.




The courgette plant has powdery mildew on the leaves. This is a very common thing to get on cucumbers, pumpkins, zucchini and the like. It is a fungal infection and only seems to affect the leaves. If you look closely you can see the hyphae of the fungi as it spreads across the leaf.



Our bay tree has scale insects. These look like small domes on the stems of the plant. These are the females which have soft bodies and no limbs, and are concealed underneath domed scales, extruding quantities of wax for protection. The males look like small flies and look like a completely different species. The waxy covering protects the female against most pesticides, but an oil solution seems to work.

The zinnia flowers (near the training room) are a favourite with monarch butterflies and multiple ones are often seen feeding there.

Waitangi Day is recognised as New Zealand's national day and is the most important marker in the country's history. The Waitangi Day Act 1960 declared 6 February to be Waitangi Day; a national day of thanksgiving in commemoration of the signing of the Treaty of Waitangi.



Arts and crafts!



Hello fellow crafters. This is a spot where we can all share our crafts and encourage each other to keep growing our own chosen field. I'll start off, but I hope others will feel they can contribute about their own craft.

Mine has grown in the past year. I started making small frames with dried flowers and leaves. I'm now making three dimensional items like bird houses and floating pyramids as well as experimenting with resin. Through it all I try to use natural items and am always picking things up. A cicada husk here, an acorn, a flower and soon I have an overload of items with no current purpose (they all find a use eventually).

I press a lot of items so they are flat and easy to stick on things, and to preserve them. My press is really simple - paper under some paving bricks. I usually leave things in there for three months to ensure they are totally dry. It's over time to remove a load of this from the press, but I'll get to it sometime. Some things, like pansies, seem to press really well, but others like agapanthus press really bad as the petals are mainly water and once dry there isn't much left. I've found red flowers tend to go dark or black when pressed. I suspect this is because there is air in the press and this reacts with the red and breaks it down.

I started using PVA glue for things but now tend to use Mod Podge as it makes a good sealer over the finished article as well as a glue. You can get it in different types like matte or gloss as well as an aerosol. I find combining the matte and gloss on different parts of an item (like matte on the background and gloss on the items stuck to it) can create a nice effect.




